<b>I. Grammar (40%)</b>												
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>o Grammar questions are both stand-alone and passage-based, focusing on the test taker’s ability to identify and analyze Latin forms and syntax</li> <li>— they measure the ability to make morphological changes to a given Latin word or phrase by declining or conjugating the form</li> <li>— they measure the ability to provide the correct structural and lexical completion of a sentence</li> <li>— they measure the ability to replace part or all of a sentence with an alternate structure that is closest to the original meaning</li> <li>— they measure the ability to identify the grammatical form or function of a word, phrase, or clause in the context of a literary passage</li> <li>— they measure the ability to recognize and interpret Latin roots in English words</li> </ul>												
<b>II. Reading Comprehension (30%)</b>												
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>o Reading Comprehension questions are based on four to six authentic 40- to 100-word passages, drawn from classical and later Latin, both prose and poetry, with glosses of unfamiliar words provided</li> </ul>												

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<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>— they measure the ability to translate, paraphrase, or summarize portions of the passage</li> <li>— they measure the ability to draw inferences from what is stated or implied in the passage</li> <li>— they measure the ability to identify the referents of pronouns, the subjects of verbs, etc., within the passage</li> <li>— they measure the ability to analyze rhetorical strategies or literary devices employed in the passage</li> <li>— they measure the ability to scan hexameter lines within a passage of poetry</li> </ul>												
<b>III. Roman Civilization (20%)</b>												
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>o Roman Civilization questions are both standalone and passage-based, covering various aspects of Roman culture</li> </ul>												
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>— they measure knowledge of Roman mythology; private and public life; government and law; history; geography; religion; art, architecture, and archaeology; literary facts; philosophy; and education</li> </ul>												
<b>IV. Pedagogy (10%)</b>												
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>o Pedagogy questions are both stand-alone and passage-based, covering various aspects of teaching Latin</li> </ul>												
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>— they measure skills relevant to the classroom experience, such as effective lesson planning, Latin pronunciation, and translation guidance</li> <li>— they measure familiarity with curricular materials, professional organizations, and published resources</li> </ul>
