



## Nebraska's Cross-Systems Approach to School Safety: Education Work Group

**Overall Goal:** To collectively support, enhance and sustain safe, healthy and successful learning environments for all Nebraska's children and youth through a comprehensive, integrated cross-systems approach to school safety, grounded in collaboration, context and best practice.

### Guiding Principles:

- Creating safe, inclusive and welcoming learning environments is essential to educating and preparing children and youth to achieve their highest potential.
- Schools building and sustaining positive relationships and a climate of trust with students and families is key.
- An integrated, collaborative cross-systems approach school safety is essential at both local and State levels.
- School safety efforts must balance the physical safety and psychological safety of all students, including those with special needs.
- Efforts to improve school safety, school climate and student learning are not separate endeavors nor should be undertaken in siloed isolation.
- School safety efforts should be based on evidence-based practices, policies and standards whenever possible, with consideration given to the unique context of the school, district, community and student population(s) served.
- The capacity across all systems to effectively address school safety must be collectively supported through proactive leadership, stakeholder engagement and sustainable change.

**Recommendations:** The following recommendations, grouped by priority area, are organized under the primary components of school safety that each address - **Prevention, Preparedness, Response and Recovery**.

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Establish and support a <b>Statewide Reporting System</b> for anonymous tips on potential threats.*</li> <li>▪ Ensure and support statewide availability of <b>Multiple Reporting Avenues</b> for students, schools staff, families and the general public.*</li> </ul>		
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Develop and align written guidance on timely, prudent and appropriate <b>Cross-Systems Information Sharing, Emergency Communications and Incident Command Protocols</b> across all systems involved.*</li> <li>▪ Develop and deliver ongoing <b>Cross-Systems Information Sharing Training</b> to all systems (e.g., FERPA, HIPAA).*</li> </ul>		
	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Establish and align <b>Accountability Mechanisms</b> to ensure when information is shared, there is a timely, appropriate and coordinated response across all systems.</li> </ul>	

Standard Response Protocols (SRP)

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Adopt and align evidence-based <b>Standard Response Protocols (SRP), Common Signage and Vocabulary on School Safety</b> across all schools and involved systems statewide.</li> <li>▪ Adopt <b>I Love You Guys Protocols</b> statewide, addressing a spectrum of incidents (e.g., school events open to the public, after-school events, off-grounds events, bomb threats, Hazmat incidents, etc.) and student populations (young children, students with disabilities or limited mobility, ELL students, etc.).</li> <li>▪ Integrate these protocols into overall emergency preparedness in schools and across systems statewide.</li> </ul>		
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Statutorily mandate <b>School Lock-Out and Lock-Down Drills</b> at least once a semester.</li> <li>▪ Encourage cross-systems participation in these drills.</li> </ul>		
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>▪ Encourage schools' adoption of <b>Emergency Response, Re-Unification and Recovery Talking Points for Parents</b>.*</li> <li>▪ Encourage schools to share these resources with care givers, child care providers and all involved systems.*</li> </ul>		

Positive School Climate, Relationships and Partnerships

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Encourage schools' adoption of <b>Evidence-Based Practices</b> in fostering positive relationships and a climate of trust with students and families; addressing student behavior (e.g., Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS), Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS) and Social-Emotional Learning); and school safety measures promoting a positive school climate and community of caring, rather than hardening schools buildings.</li> </ul>			
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Increase statewide availability and schools' access to <b>Professional Consultation</b> with Behavioral Health Practitioners.*</li> </ul>			<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Increase statewide availability and schools' access to <b>Professional Consultation</b>.*</li> </ul>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Reduce <b>Stigma attached to Mental Health</b> and address related bullying through ongoing evidence-based <b>Training for School Staff</b> and expanded health/wellness <b>Curricula for Students</b> statewide.*</li> </ul>			
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Expand and deliver ongoing evidence-based <b>Training for Law Enforcement and SROs</b> statewide on adolescent brain development and students with special needs (e.g., trauma history, physically or developmentally disabled, etc.).</li> </ul>

Cross-Systems Threat Assessment Teams

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Establish and support local/regional <b>Cross-Systems Threat Assessment Teams</b> statewide, which include school administrators, mental health practitioners, school resource officers (SROs) and law enforcement.*</li> <li>Develop and deliver ongoing evidence-based <b>Team Training</b> statewide, on topics such as early warning signs, risk factors, effects of trauma, self-harm, threat assessment, etc.*</li> </ul>		
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Increase statewide availability and schools' access to mental health practitioners trained in suicide screening, risk assessment <u>and</u> threat assessment.*</li> </ul>		

Cross-Systems Crisis Response Teams	
PREPAREDNESS	RESPONSE
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Expand and support local/regional <b>Cross-Systems Crisis Response Teams</b> statewide, which include school staff, SROs, mental health practitioners, 911 operators, law enforcement, first responders and emergency medical facilities.</li> <li>Develop and deliver ongoing evidence-based <b>Team Training</b> statewide on response to a variety of incidents.</li> </ul>	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Expand and support <b>Emergency Response Capacities in Rural Areas</b> to address minimal law enforcement coverage, volunteer first responders and longer response times.</li> </ul>
