

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Charlamos: My Travel Abroad



While attending the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, I participated in a summer study program at the Instituto Tecnológico y de Estudios Superiores de Monterrey Campus Querétaro. Within three weeks, my hesitant and broken Spanish phrasing was replaced by a fluency that more accurately represented four years of Spanish study.

In 2007, I participated in a Fulbright Hayes exchange to Uruguay that revolutionized my teaching and fundamental understanding of language learning. In 2007 and 2009, I took student groups to Mexico and Costa Rica where I saw unprecedented growth in individual understanding of culture, language, and sense of self from each student.

In 2009, I served as a translator on a trip to the Dominican Republic where I learned that a sense of community can move mountains in education. Each travel experience has furthered my capabilities as a human being in ways that I could never expect or believe possible.

My high school French teacher, Madame Lamski, used to tell me how important it is to go on our own adventures. At that time, I could only question 'how'. Now, I can only ask, 'how not'? My hope for you and your students is that you can have your own travel adventure in the year to come.

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What's a Fulbright?

"Fulbright" refers to Senator J. William Fulbright who, in 1945, introduced a bill to promote international good will through foreign exchange of scholars and teachers.

Fulbright Distinguished Awards in Teaching

The Fulbright Distinguished Awards in Teaching Program for U.S. Teachers offers long-term and short-term programs. The long-term program is three to six months. Primary and secondary teachers study at a host institution, participate in a virtual community, and work at a local school in the host country. Recipients receive financing for travel, lodging, and institutional fees that may apply. Recipients also receive a maintenance allowance. Long-term programs are oriented to the individual and include an individualized study plan. Family may travel with the Fulbright recipient of the long-term program.

Short-term programs may last two to six weeks abroad. The recipient will receive financing for travel, lodging, meals, local transportation, and related expenses. Short-term travel is an individual program focused on development of an educational initiative determined by the US or the host country.

Destination countries for both short-term and long-term programs change from year to year. Application dates vary by destination country. It is important to check the website regularly. More information can be found at: <https://www.fulbrightteacherexchange.org/>

Fulbright Hays Seminars Abroad

The Fulbright Hays Seminars Abroad Bilateral Projects are summer programs that focus on chosen topics in three select areas. For example, this year's programs are Exploring Cultural and Social Diversities in India, Examining the Impact of Ecuador's History, Biodiversity, and Cultural Diversity, and Exploring Contemporary US Polish Relations. **These applications are due February 2, 2018.** Recipients of the grant receive airfare, lodging, fees, travel costs, and a stipend.

Fulbright Teachers for Global Classrooms

Recently, the Teachers for Global Classrooms became part of the Fulbright experience. Fulbright TGC is a year-long professional development opportunity for K-12 US educators to prepare students for a competitive global economy. Teachers complete a semester-long online course focusing on best practices in global education, gather in Washington DC for a face-to-face workshop, and travel abroad for two to three weeks. As a capstone project, teachers complete a global education guide for their local community. Applications are due March 13, 2018.
