History Endorsement Guidelines To Accompany Rule 24 (Adopted by the State Board of Education on 8/11/06)

## 006.31 History

006.31A Grade Levels: 6-12

006.31B Endorsement Type: Subject

<u>006.31C</u> Persons with this endorsement may teach history in grades 6 through 12.

<u>006.31D</u> Certification Endorsement Requirements: This endorsement requires a minimum of 36 semester hours including 30 semester hours in history and a minimum of six (6) semester hours in one or more of the other social sciences areas (Economics, Geography, Political Science, Psychology, and Sociology).

<u>006.31E</u> Endorsement Program Requirements: Standard institutions of higher education offering this endorsement program must have on file, within the institution, a plan which identifies the courses and the course completion requirements which the institution utilizes to grant credit toward completion of this endorsement. The courses shall incorporate the Nebraska social studies/history content standards into the curriculum as applicable to the grade level endorsement.

<u>006.31F</u> Effective September 1, 2015, an applicant will be required to submit a passing score as set forth in Appendix C for the applicable content test for the first-time placement of this endorsement on a Nebraska certificate or permit.

## THE FOLLOWING ARE RECOMMENDED GUIDELINES FOR INCLUSION AS PART OF THE INSTITUTION'S PLAN UNDER THIS ENDORSEMENT.

Through the courses identified in its plan, the institution should prepare prospective teachers to:

- A. Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of the concepts, principles, and processes of inquiry in American and World History, and be able to apply them, including being able to:
  - 1. Analyze patterns of continuity and change in multiple regions and time;
  - 2. Demonstrate a global knowledge and understanding of peoples, cultures, and;
  - 3. Use historical analysis and interpretation to consider multiple perspectives, including the perspectives of marginalized and historically underrepresented groups;
  - 4. Use a chronological framework to understand the sociological, political, economic and cultural history of the global community through time;
  - 5. Demonstrate knowledge and understanding of the cultural history of Nebraska, including Native American cultures;
  - 6. Analyze the impact of Nebraska's past and present on United States history;

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- 7. Investigate, interpret, and analyze important events and persistent issues using multiple historical and contemporary resources; and
- 8. Asking historical questions, identifying and collecting historical data, analyzing and visualizing historical data, making decisions based on conclusions drawn from inquiry process.
